This year's West Australian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Sector Conference keynotes featured speakers across disciplines, from Uncle Mick Gooda, Australia's former Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner; to Wise Group's Director of Health Equity Hine Martin. Addresses also included WA Minister for Health and Mental Health, the Hon. Meredith Hammat MLA, WA Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, the Hon. Don Punch, and Australian rules football midfielder Tim Kelly.

In their respective keynote addresses, NACCHO Chief Executive Pat Turner AM and AHCWA Chair Vicki O'Donnell OAM raised concerns about the lack of investment in Priority Reform implementation, noting a disappointing disparity between the commitments to Closing the Gap by the WA Government in their recent State Budget with what was handed down in New South Wales and Victoria. 
Youth Committee Statement on Lateral Violence


WA ACCHS COVID-19 Response Review

AHCWA's Health and Wellbeing team launched our new community-led stroke prevention campaign at the Member Services Forum, highlighting the importance of FAST awareness:

Face drooping

Arm weakness

Speech difficulty

Time to call emergency services

This presentation offered insight into how localised education and culturally informed strategies can improve recognition and response times across Aboriginal communities in WA.
