

When referring to 'Aboriginal' we are referring to all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

I heard it's for when they're getting sexy with someone, so why the helly do they need it now?
12 and 13 years old—they're so young!

FACT

Recommended age for all genders is 12-13 years. Early protection is best.

Nurse told me that it works better if they get it younger and then we know they are protected **before** they start getting sexy with someone.

FACT

HPV is spread by close contact with another person who has the virus. It can show up as warts on the skin or have no signs at all.

The virus spreads fast like a bush fire through the skin during sexual contact. Nearly all of us will have had it in our lives. It doesn't give any signs sometimes.

We never had this Gardasil 9 needle when we were their age and we're ok.

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We might not be okay.

That's why we need to have regular checks, them cervical screening tests to check for the HPV. They reckon that's why Nanna J got cervical cancer.



FACT

The use of condoms is always advised during sexual contact but only provides some protection against HPV.

FACT

Due to the success of the HPV vaccine and cervical screening, **Australia is on track to eliminate cervical cancer.**The HPV vaccine has already lowered cases across the country by preventing the virus that causes most cervical cancers. This will protect young people and future generations to come.







Take him to the pharmacy or the Doctor. They can give it to him in private and he won't feel any shame. Just make sure he gets it on time so he's protected early.

Give him some food before you go,

- get him to wear a short-sleeved shirt,
- keep his muscles soft,
- wiggle his toes,
- think about something else,
- and lie him down if they have a bed.

It all helps!



The Gardasil 9 vaccine is available through the school-based immunisation program, at medical clinics, Aboriginal Medical Services, and some pharmacies.



Thanks, sis. This is real important. Do they get sick from the vaccine needle?

Nah, sis. Maybe a sore arm for a bit, but this Gardasil 9 needle has been given to kids for a long time now and it gets checked regularly in Australia to make sure it's still safe. They'll be right.





Looks like we got homework to do! Awkward yarn about sexy times, HPV and cancer, sign the consent, and get the kids ready for their needle.

FACT

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) checks the safety and quality of vaccines before they can be used in Australia.
The TGA monitors vaccines for safety after they are supplied in Australia.

FACT

Common side effects include pain, swelling, redness, bruise around needle site in arm.

Sometimes headache, tired, fever or dizzy. Serious side effects are extremely rare.

The staff who give vaccines are trained to deal with them if they should occur.

HPV is **Human Papillomavirus**.

There are lots of different types.

There is **often no signs** you have HPV. Many people's immune systems will

naturally clear the HPV.

Some **HPV** can lead to warts or cancers

of the mouth, throat, cervix, and genitals. **HPV is spread easily** through the skin during

sexual contact.

Condoms alone are not enough to protect from HPV

Gardasil 9 is the vaccine

that protects you from the HPV types that cause cancer .

Early protection is best,

given at 12-13 years.

Catch up vaccination is advised if missed at this age.

It's only one needle.

It's free for 12-25 years of age.

Get it at easily at school, doctor's clinic, AMS, and some pharmacies.
